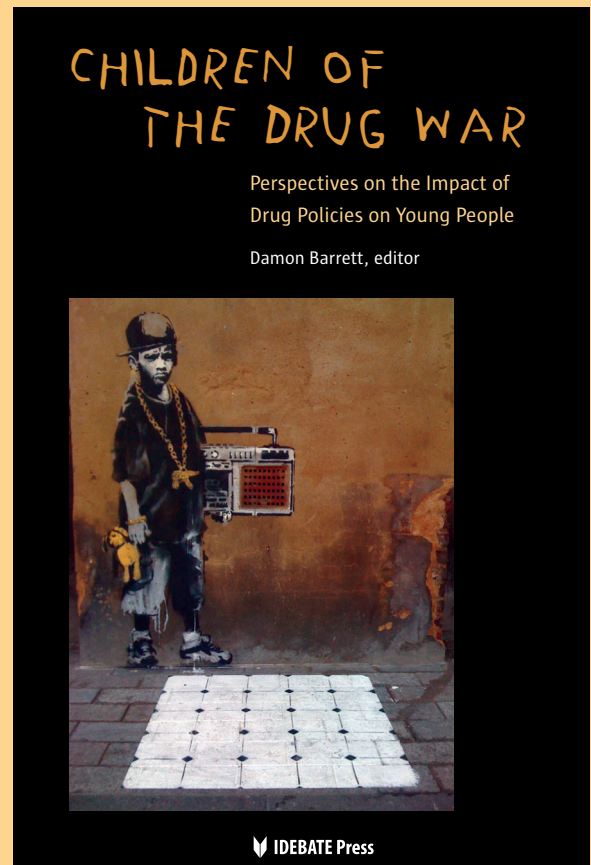
CHILDREN OF THE DRUG WAR is a unique collection of original essays that investigates the impacts of the war on drugs on children, young people, and their families.
